Technology can open up

Technology can open up a whole new world for blind and vision impaired young people, from enabling them to see better, to helping them live independently. Thanks to your kindness, our incredible Assistive Technology Officer, Alex, is helping blind young people gain all the knowledge they need.

Alex teaches people how to use a wide range of devices such as smart phones, computers and braille readers. He also offers practical advice on how everyday devices can be used to support vision impaired people in areas such as travel, finances, wellbeing, school – the list goes on! To help more VI people

Alex ran 222 assistive tech sessions in 2024, empowering 164 VI young people. access and understand technology, Alex has also created Tech Corner. This is a new range of webinars, which will help many more blind and vision impaired young people, and their families, access Alex's expertise. # Your support is helping to solve the SEND crisis

There are currently lots of headlines about how children and young people with SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) are finding it difficult to access education and get the support they need. It was recently reported that the system is in crisis and could result in a 'lost generation of children'.

RSBC welcomes the report, by The Public Accounts
Committee, and the government's planned £1bn investment in SEND. However, while the solutions to the crisis are still under review, it's not yet clear what that £1bn will achieve.





But there is hope ahead. Dorton College, our independent specialist college for vision impaired 16 to 25-year-olds, many who have additional needs, is shining a light on best practice and offering policymakers a new way of thinking about inclusive education.

### The Dorton way

Students have 'the best of both worlds' by benefiting from specialist education, provided by specialists like RSBC, and mainstream education from general further education colleges.

This means qualified specialists are there to provide regular support, which is tailored to our blind and vision impaired students' individual needs.

Our young people then have the very best chance of succeeding and completing their courses, as they have the additional help they need.

Your support is helping us advocate and instigate change to make sure the system works for all SEND children. We'll keep you updated on our progress and how you can get involved.

### Meet one of our Young Ambassadors

A Representing vision impaired people is so important to me. I want to show that we can make the world a better place for anyone who is blind or partially sighted.

#### Q What have you learned?

A I've learnt to be confident in public. I make audio clips to help with this and recorded one for Disability Pride Day last year, sharing my thoughts on why the day matters. It was a proud moment.

### Q What are your goals as a Young Ambassador for 2025?

A I would like to make more content for RSBC's website and social media, and share all the ways my vison impairment impacts me – the ups and the downs, but mostly ups!



# Mum Nicola thinks you're the best

We'd like to share the story of mum Nicola and her super seven-year-old George. They both have Axenfeld-Rieger Syndrome (ARS), a rare genetic disorder that affects the development of the front part of the eye. Here Nicola tells you why they have so much to thank you for.

"George was born with cloudy corneas. When he was only a few months old he underwent surgery to have corneal transplants.

Unfortunately, one of the transplants failed before he turned two. George is now registered as severely vison impaired and uses a long cane.

Despite the challenges he faced, George thrived and was a happy toddler. But, as he got a bit older, he struggled to understand why he did things differently to his friends.



It was hard when he worked at a different pace at school and needed help to go to the toilet. He became anxious, and that's when I realised we needed help.

### Thanks to your support, RSBC was able to give us that help.

Our Family Practitioner, Jeanette, quickly connected with George, helping him to be confident about his differences, talk openly about his feelings and manage his anxiety."

It's only thanks to supporters like you that we're able to reach children like George and provide the vital support they need to thrive.
